The vision, mission and objectives of our college are to make our students academically sound, mentally alert, socially conscious, morally upright, environmentally aware and “Man” in the true sense of the term.

6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

6.3.1 Curriculum Development

Curricular planning & implementation is done by the college. Syllabus is divided into 3 modules throughout the year. Classes are taken based on modules. Educational excursion is organized by various departments

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

Modern teaching methods like using projectors are being practiced besides chalk and talk. The departments organize Educational Excursions, advanced learner lectures, parent teacher meetings to discuss the development of student and consider the proposals of parents if any.

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

Regular class tests and test examinations are organized by the college. The individual departments organize Merit Tests to identify academically disadvantaged students.

6.3.4 Research and Development

Many of our teachers are involved in active research. 12 research papers of our teachers have been published in International peer reviewed Journals and 15 more have been published in National peer reviewed journals. There are three ongoing minor research projects. One MRP has been submitted for approval. Our college also publishes a peer reviewed journal for encouraging research activity.

6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

As per the recommendation of the NAAC peer team the college is striving to make the library fully computerized. Within the next 2-3 years. IQAC has recommended the installation of KOHA software for modernization of the library. The library now has three computers and a Xerox Machine. 90% of the books are catalogued in the computer. Almost all departments have internet connectivity, LCD projector, digital cameras etc. College also has a plan to build a modern auditorium which is very much required for conducting Seminars and Workshops.

6.3.6 Human Resource Management

The college encourages the teachers to participate in the Refreshers' Course, Orientation Programme, Workshops, Seminars and Conferences; also, they are encouraged to publish papers and books. The teachers awarded Ph.D. get felicitated by the Teachers' Council.

6.3.7 Faculty and Staff recruitment

The recruitment of permanent teaching faculties are conducted by WBCSC and outside the scope of the college. However, Selection of Guest teaching faculty and non-teaching staff, is carried out by the College authority.

Students are selected for admission to the various Degree Courses on the basis of merit at the previous qualifying examination and the reservation norms, through online process. (SWOT analysis)

Strength:

1. A good number of full time teachers (12) have joined our college in the vacant posts this year and we have come to know that few new full time teachers will join very soon. So the academic, teaching & learning section of our college is now enough strong than previous year.

2. Our college is now eligible to get Rs. 20000000/- from RUSA as our college was accredited 2nd cycle by NAAC and got the rank B in the last year. Therefore we can develop the total infrastructure of our college as per our need and plan.

3. Most of the teachers (33) have attained PhD degrees and few new teachers are pursuing their PhD. Not only that, most of the teachers are publishing research papers in various Journals, Magazines etc. regularly. So our teaching faculties are very much academic and research minded and this faculty is our main strength.

4. Progression of students of our college is satisfactory considering the rural background of the college.

5. Community development and social awareness program taken up by the NSS/NCC (blood donation, tree plantation, gender awareness, de-worming etc.). Community linkage involving women SHG of nearby villages in various extension programs are good.

6. College offers full and half fee and students-aids to poor students.

7. College provides opportunities to students for participation in sports, cultural program and extracurricular activities.

8. Library is the nucleus of any academic institution and we are proud of our library. Our students can search their necessary books among 38513 books of our Central Library. This library is now almost fully computerized. Not only that each Honours Department of our college has founded seminar library and students also can access books from these seminar libraries.

Weakness:

1. Non-teaching faculty is gradually decreasing and we have to depend on the part time staff for administrative and clerical work. Since long years we have not been getting permission from Government to recruit full time non-teaching staff.

2. Till now we could not digitize/computerize our total administrative/ academic or clerical work.

3. Recently our college has opened five new subjects, i.e. Geography, Physical Education, Education, Hindi & Urdu in the demand of local people. But we could not create any full time teaching post for these subjects. We have to wait for long time for getting the permission from Government for creating new sanctioned post for these subjects.

4. Lack of laboratory space in Science teaching departments and insufficient equipments in the laboratory.

Opportunity:

1. College authority is trying to set up a separate building for department of commerce. We can open few Commerce allied subjects like BBA, vocational subjects etc. after set up the building..
2. Effort is on for setting up of an auditorium for the college. After set up the auditorium we can organize so many educational and employment oriented seminars, programs, work shop etc. for the larger interest of our students.
3. As our teaching faculty is increasing enough and a good number of teachers will join very soon as per policy of the Government, we will be able to open few PG Courses in near future.

Threat:

1. Five newly introduced departments with pass course are being taught without any permanent faculty member.
2. Lack of classrooms and laboratory space.
3. Students showing greater interest towards job-oriented courses and thus there is a gradual shortfall of good quality students in this general degree course studies.
